TIP '

BLENDING COLOURS

Step 1

Create a faint outline using a Derwent Graphic 2B pencil. If your outline looks too dark, use a Derwent Pencil Eraser and lightly rub over your lines to make them appear fainter. Fill in the eyeball using Light Ochre, taking care not to go over the pupil or reflections. Picking up your Yellow Ochre, in small circles, work your way along the outer edge of the eyeball and pupil to begin creating a base.

Step 2

Repeat the same technique used on the Yellow Ochre with Mars Orange, starting with more pressure on the edge of the eyeball and around the pupil, easing the pressure as you move away from the edge to create a gradient. Repeat this with Crag Green but only along the top edge of the eyeball and around the pupil as this will create a stronger shadow.

Step 3

Leaving the highlights blank, fill the pupil and area around the eyeball with Carbon Grey before filling the pupil in with Ivory Black. On the outer areas around the eyeball, add the black around the edges using the same gradient technique used around the edges of the eyeball. If you wish, you can add a little Carbon Grey to the refection.









Tip 2

LAYERING AND BASE COLOURS

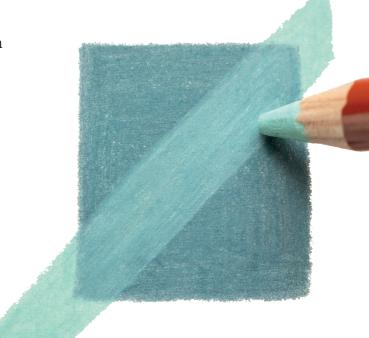
When painting, colours and shades are mixed together on a palette before being applied to a canvas.

As this cannot be done with pencils, the process occurs on the paper, making layering an important step. A stage that is often missed when drawing, is using a solid base colour. Completely fill the area you wish to apply tone to with your base colour to remove the white of the paper, ensuring you are not fighting against it when adding in darker colours later on. To select a base colour, observe your subject and pick the lightest colour you can see.

| Tip 3

LIGHT OVER DARK

Due to the creamy, opaque nature of the pencils, it is possible to layer light colours over dark which is a very unique and helpful quality. Rather than automatically reaching for an eraser to remove unwanted pigment in darker areas, simply grab a lighter shade and go over the required area to give a smooth blend. This technique also works well for creating lighter subjects on dark backgrounds such as adding in highlights and whiskers, giving the pencils a very forgiving nature.



Tip 4

USING TONED PAPER

Working on plain white paper can feel a little time consuming, especially when you are placing down darker tones as it can require quite a few layers to create the required effect. By using different shades of paper, it allows you to easily apply both high and lowlights as you already have a solid base colour to work from. This assists in speeding up the process of a drawing and can create a much richer end result with less effort.

Tip 5

CREATING HIGHLIGHTS

Perfecting the art of adding highlights to a piece can be the difference between making a drawing look realistic and three dimensional or flat. To create 'back to white' highlights, removing all pigment to reveal the white paper beneath on subjects such as whiskers, simply use a Derwent Electric Eraser. Holding down the button, move it along the surface to remove any unwanted colour. If you stray a little too far, not to worry. Pick up your pencils and simply fill in the area up to the highlight as required.

Tip 6

SWATCH PALETTE

Having an array of colours may leave you wondering where to begin and which to use as it can be difficult to know how they will look once down on the paper. To assist with future drawings, create a swatch palette of all colours to reference. They do not have to be solid squares,







get creative and try different shapes. As an additional tip, create a gradient within each shape by applying more pressure one side and gradually easing the pressure as you work across. This will show what each colour looks like with both a lot and little pressure.

Tip 7

DRAWING FUR

Step 1

Begin with a solid base colour of Champagne. This does not have to be neat as layers will be added over the top, but to assist when adding these other layers, move your pencil in the direction of the fur to act as a guide. Once the base is down, use the Derwent Twin Hole Sharpener to add a point to the Brown Ochre, this does not need to be sharp. Lay down strokes, following the direction of the fur whilst overlapping and waving them to ensure each fur strand is not a straight line.

Step 2

Repeat the same process as the Brown Ochre with Mars Orange, overlapping the two colours. This will add additional depth and tones to the fur to make it appear thicker.

Step 3

Using Sepia Red, apply using the same fur strokes method to the darker areas of the fur where shadows are most prominent. Begin by applying minimal pressure if you are a little nervous to add in too much dark and gradually apply more pressure as you increase in confidence until you are happy with the final result.



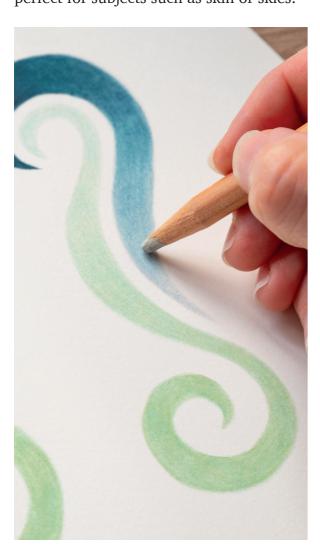




Tip 8

EXTRA-SMOOTH BLENDING

Due to the creamy nature of these pencils, it is very easy to blend them together. However, if you require an extra-smooth look, the Derwent Blender is the perfect accessory to use. Simply lay down your chosen colours, either by overlapping different shades or creating a gradient with one colour. Once happy, pick up your Blender, ensuring it has a flat edge, and move it over the pigment in small circles working from light to dark. This technique removes any surface texture, no matter how slight, and is perfect for subjects such as skin or skies.



Tip 9

WHITE OVER COLOUR

Step 1

Create a drawing without any white highlights such as a flower.



Step 2

Picking up the Chinese White, begin to layer on the pigment in the required areas to create highlights or shine to the subject. Due to the opaque nature of the pencil, it gives the option to use light pressure to create a hint of highlight or to draw a stronger white highlight by applying more pressure and adding a few layers of white in the same area.



Tip 10

DETAILS OVER BACKGROUNDS

Step 1

Begin with a light colour such as Champagne and cover the entire area to create a solid base. There is no need to sharpen the pencil for this, the size of the pencil core is perfect for large coverage and the barrel width ensures a good grip. To enhance the base colour if needed, lightly add a layer of Sunflower, working in small circles to seamlessly blend together the colours.



Pick up the Fresh Green and beginning at the top, apply firm pressure and work the pencil from side to side whilst moving down the paper, gradually releasing pressure until you nearly reach the bottom. Leave a little gap to show the base colours from step 1. Repeat this process using Crag Green followed by Olive Earth, leaving a little space each time for the colour underneath.

Step 3

Using both Sepia Red and Crag green, create overlapping strokes from the bottom up and remember, they don't have to look neat as grass grows in all directions. Then using Heather, draw a few stalks and leaf or flower shapes. If you would prefer some lighter flowers, try using Chinese White as it can be overlayed on top of darker colours.

Derwent uses the Blue Wool test (ISO 105) to evaluate lightfastness. Lightfastness refers to the chemical stability of a pigment under long exposure to light. A scale of 1-8 is obtained, with values of 6 or higher being considered to be highly lightfast and, under museum conditions, will not fade for 100+ years.
